Jefferson EDGE 2020 CRIME ABATEMENT Status Report 2: October, 2009

Prepared by JEDCO and GCR & Associates, Inc.





In response to concerns about quality of life in Jefferson Parish and its impact upon the community's economic competitiveness, JEDCO initiated the Jefferson Edge 2020 Quality of Life initiative. This initiative has produced eight "strategic implementation plans" which include a series of action items to address particular quality of life issues. Implementing the action items requires the total cooperation and keen interest of all involved, including JEDCO, the Jefferson Parish government, numerous other entities, and frequently State and Federal agencies. In 2008, JEDCO retained GCR & Associates, Inc. to prepare semiannual reports outlining the status of each of these action items and overall progress toward implementation.

The following table summarizes the progress made toward each of the crime prevention (CP) and anti-blight (AB) action items.

However, in February 2009, the Council removed the sales tax increase referendum from the ballot due to an error in the ballot language. Demand for stable employment in a down economy has partially addressed JPSO's post-Katrina personnel shortages, resulting in fewer job vacancies. Additionally, the political/ economic climate is unfavorable for a new revenue source at this time.	No further action at this time. Continue to monitor the personnel needs of local law enforcement agencies and evaluate the need for a revenue measure of this kind in the future. Currently the state only has secured funding for two parishes: Caddo and Orleans Parish.	Assemble State committee/task force; formulate recommendations and pass legislation. This amount will fund the program through June 30, 2010, but this total represents a 23% cut from the FY2009 appropriation. Additionally, no secure, long-term funding for this program has been identified. CP5	Initiate a major public outreach campaign to inform the public about new anti-crime initiatives and crime fighting successes	Unveil website and issue newsletter in 2008	JEDCO is spearheading the production of a custom publication, "Jefferson Life Magazine", which highlights a different quality of life initiative every issue. "Jefferson Life Magazine" is mailed to select households and is available at multiple pick-up points around Jefferson Parish. Although crime abatement has not been a headlining topic and is not scheduled to be for the next several issues, it has been featured prominently in the two issues of Jefferson Life that have been released. The Sheriff's Office has purchased five pages of editorial space in the first four issues of the magazine, providing an opportunity to highlight gains in crime abatement. In the fall issue of Jefferson Life, there was also a story on the new crime lab being built by JPSO. The Opportunity Lives Here campaign also sent out an e-mail blast highlighting the purchase of new vehicles for code enforcement. Another medium for disseminating information about crime abatement efforts is the new West Bank Beacon newspaper, which is covering the entire quality of life initiative in Jefferson. Before the end of the year, the newspaper will feature an article on crime abatement efforts. This action item is not marked as complete because continued public outreach is essential throughout the life of the Jefferson EDGE initiative.	Determine a schedule and preferred media for continued outreach on crime abatement in the coming years. Also, determine whether a headlining story on crime abatement would be appropriate in Jefferson Life magazine.

During the 2009 Regular Session, HB 644 was signed into law by Governor Jindal (Act 515) to further strengthen the enforcement of code violations in Jefferson. Fines associated with a failure to repair or demolish derelict structures can now be placed on ad valorem tax bills, as can fines associated with zoning, property maintenance, or other violations. The Parish now has the ability to pursue payment of these violations in the same way that it can pursue non-payment of property (ad valorem) taxes.	No further action required.

This ordinance amends Chapter 20 and enacts Chapter 17.5 of the Parish Code of Ordinances. It enacts criminal penalties for renting out rooms by the hour—up to six months in jail and a \$500 fine. The Parish now also has the authority to rescind an occupational license on the basis of code violations and/ or drug and prostitution arrests on the property. Preliminary indications are that the program has been successfully in identifying prospective tenants with extensive criminal histories. The Parish also hired a Crime Prevention and Quality of Life Coordinator in spring, 2009 to further address issues of crime and neighborhood quality.	Investigate the legal feasibility of establishing a liaison to market rate landlords for performing criminal background checks on prospective tenants. If legally feasible, pass an ordinance to begin this program.			
			As originally conceived, this action item would provide a more accessible resource for market rate landlords as well as those participating in the Section 8 program. A criminal background check liaison has yet to be provided for market rate landlords/tenants, and there are questions about the legality of providing such a service as there is no existing law permitting this service.				
AB6	Work with the Jefferson Parish Housing Authority to conduct more stringent pre-occupancy inspections of Section 8 housing units	Improve inspection protocols and formalize relationship with Inspection and Code Enforcement in 2008- 2009	According to the Crime Prevention and Quality of Life Coordinator for Jefferson Parish, the Parish Government is working closely with the Jefferson Parish Housing Authority to establish closer coordination and more rigid pre-occupancy/pre-qualifying inspections for Section 8 units. This program has yet to be formally initiated, but discussions are underway between the Housing Authority and Parish Government. This funding could go toward the implementation of this action item, but this one-time funding source would likely not be sufficient to address the full range of redevelopment needs.	Identify a potential date and a strategy for putting a sales tax proposal to Jefferson voters to fund this and other crime abatement initiatives. Monitor the status of the Neighborhood Stabilization grant application. Investigate other potential revenue sources.			
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
